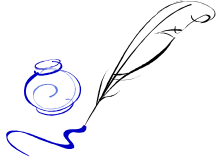
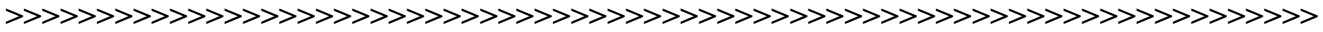

That prompts a memory of the stories my Uncle Jude would tell about when he worked for the Road Commission. He was in his early twenties back then and he said that all the workers had to supply their own tools and transportation for the job. According to Uncle Jude, the Road Commission did not have a fleet of trucks for the workers to use. So that meant that he had to acquire an old truck, shovels, rakes and pick axes for his job duties. Uncle Jude apparently liked the job well enough in the summer when the weather was not too hot or too wet. But when winter arrived, the job was not nearly as much fun. He would tell us that when a big snowstorm arrived in the local area, all of the workers living near him would meet at the main road. They would start digging at the snowdrifts with their hand shovels until they had cleared that drift. Then they would move on down the road to the next big snowdrift and begin shoveling all over again. I can't imagine clearing the roads this way. I suspect that there might be a little exaggeration involved. Sometimes the passage of time makes the memories become a little more sensational as they are enhanced for the next generation to learn about. I can only hope that the snow was not all that deep and that the job was completed in a somewhat less strenuous way. However, the story telling made my siblings and I appreciate how much easier it was for us to shovel the porch and driveway. However, if even a small part of these stories were true, I am quite sure that I would seriously be snowed in this year!

It has been a very long winter this year. As we approach the middle of March, I would prefer to see some signs of spring in the air. Winter is usually when some of us take the time to enter information we have discovered on our journeys to visit cemeteries, libraries or other genealogical sites during the last spring, summer or fall. But because it has been a very long winter this year, I am sure that all of us have updated the computer program for our Family Tree and re-organized our hard copy files of pictures and documents. I am sure that most of us are anxiously awaiting some signs of spring, so that we can get outside and travel to meetings, seminars or family gatherings.

Some of us are planning trips to cemeteries around Memorial Day to decorate the graves of those family members that served in the military and also those graves of additional family members that have passed on. This is a time honored tradition for most of us. I think this year I will ask if my great nephews (Cody and Austin) want to go with me to place flowers on the graves at the cemeteries. They have been with us before, but they were very little when we decorated the graves and I am sure they do not remember it.

Early Settlers Laid the Groundwork For Future Greatness of Michigan

The transition of a wilderness to productive farms, comfortable homes and passable roads is an interesting and thrilling page of history

The deliviation and development of those farms into governmental state axis, a focal point of educational activity of an internationally known college and an industrial center of note is dramatic and unbelievable

The state capital wasn't the beginning of this growth, neither were the industries nor the university with it's fantastic expansion.

It was the sturdy pioneers who came into Michigan, mostly from Ohio and New England, and cut their way into the forest to build a crude shelter for a house and to establish a home.

As early as 1836 men were buying land from the government and hewing their way into the timbered land of Ingham county to lay the foundation of rural settlements.

This was several years before the site of the capital was even agreed upon; many years before there was any large industries. There were stave mills, cooper shops, blacksmith shops, and gristmills about the county.

In the years of reconstruction following the Civil War, Potterville boasted more industries than Lansing.

Farms were cleared and farm buildings were built 20 years before M.A.C, the first land grant college, was in operation.

The foundation of Ingham County was laid by the pioneers – their courage and fortitude.

The outstanding position of Ingham county today was made possible by the man with an axe and a plow.

In 1948 the Michigan Historical commission set about to recognize the importance of these men who came to Michigan early in the 19th century and whose family had carried on for a 100 years or more. These farms are registered as centennial farms after sufficient proof has been recorded of the unbroken chain of family ownership over the past 100 years.

The first year of this program 102 farms were registered, by the end of 1963 more than 1,900 farms had been recognized. At the present time more than 2,000 farms are on the registration list with several of Michigan's 105,000 farms eligible but not listed on the honor roll.

Ingham County has more than 60 Centennial farms registered only 3 of them registered this year.
