NEWS FROM THE PAST

(typed as written)

Ingham County News, Thursday, February 26, 1891

DIED

Tuesday morning, February 24, after a long illness and much suffering, at her home in Alaiedon, Mrs. G. A. Parkhurst. She was born in the township of Carleton, Orleans county, N. Y., 63 years ago last September. Forty-two years ago last October she was married to Mr. G. A. Parkhurst, and they came to Michigan 16 years ago last November, settling at Brooklyn, Jackson county. Ten years ago this month they came to Alaiedon where they have since lived. Six children were born to them, of whom four, two sons and two daughters, survive their mother to comfort the bereaved husband and father. Funeral services are held at the residence today, conducted by Rev. J. A. Barnes, and tomorrow the remains will be taken to Napoleon, Jackson county, for burial. Many friends will mourn with the stricken family. (Note: Mrs. G. A. Parkhurst was born Phebe Ann Sebring)

Ingham County News, Thursday, February 13, 1896

Mary J., wife of J. B. Worden of east Vevay, died at her home on Saturday last from lagrippe. She was taken ill the Monday before. Deceased was aged 62 years, having been a resident of this county over 30 years. She experienced religion when 11 years old and had always lived a devoted christian life. She leaves a husband, two sons and two daughters, besides a host of friends to mourn her loss. Funeral services were held at the M. E. church in Dansville last Tuesday, conducted by Rev. Bird. The remains were interred in the Dansville cemetery.

Ingham County News, Thursday, April 22, 1915

Isaac Kane, who suffered a stroke of paralysis a short time ago, passed away Monday. Funeral services were held Thursday with burial here.

Miss Beatrice Worden was taken ill very suddenly last Friday night of a nervous ailment and her condition has been quite alarming since.

Ingham County News, Thursday, May 17, 1917

MRS EDWIN HAZELTON

Mrs. Edwin Hazelton, died Saturday morning at her home in the south part of the city, having been ill for some time.

Helen Seely was born in Warren, Ohio, but moved with her parents to Mason when she was ten years of age. In 1867 she was married to F. M. Lewis and one daughter was born to them, Mrs. W. C. Barker, of Lansing. Mr. Lewis died about 10 years ago. In June, 1915, she was married to Edwin Hazelton, who survives her. She is also survived by the daughter, Mrs. W. C. Barker, of Lansing, and three sisters, Mrs. O. W. Halstead of Lansing, Mrs. T. F. Day of Pontiac and Mrs. George A. Earle of this city, a granddaughter, Mrs. E. R. Jacobs and a great granddaughter, Marian Jacobs.

KANE FUNERAL SERVICES

Funeral services for Elizabeth A. Kane, a former Mason resident, were held Wednesday afternoon at 1:00 from the Gorsline-Runciman funeral home, Lansing. Mrs. Kane died at the state hospital, Kalamazoo, Monday night. Burial was made on the family lot at Dansville beside the husband. One daughter, Mrs. George Andrews of Lansing survives.

ONE HUNDRED YEARS OF THE INGHAM COUNTY NEWS ON MICROFILM

In March the society completed the microfilming of the "Ingham County News" newspapers that cover the time span 1869 through 1969. The first phase was from 1869 to 1898; the second phase from 1899 to 1934; and the final project just completed covered the years 1935 through 1969.

The Ingham County News was a county wide newspaper published in Mason, Michigan. As was the common practice; the newspaper hired local correspondence's who reported the news in the area they lived and talked of our ancestors, illnesses, deaths, marriages, the coming and goings of the residence in their daily lives. Little reporting was published from Lansing, Williamston and Stockbridge as they had their own newspapers. Extensive coverage during the war years reported on the military draft and news from the service men and women. During the depression years of the 1930's news on unemployment reaching 25% and efforts of the Works Project Administration to provide a safety net for the unemployed and disabled.

Over the past dozen years many volunteers worked on this project, unbinding the bound newspaper books, page counting, and the time consuming task of "ironing" the pages, yes ironing pages of the newsprint. Without our volunteers these valuable old newspapers would not have been preserved on archival quality microfilm.

LOCKE TOWNSHIP SOLDIERS WHO SERVED IN WORLD WAR I

Don Albro McKie, Serial No. 2019638

was single, color white, was born in Locke Township, July 14, 1893, the eldest son of James and Helen McKie. He has two brothers Mark who served in Ambulance Co. 38 division and Ferris. He registered in Locke for service June 5, 1917, his occupation at the time being that of farmer, being associated with his father on the farm, and thoroughbred Holstein cattle. He was selected for service in Nov. 1917 and left home for Camp Custer, Nov. 21, 1917. He was assigned to Co. C, 339th Inf. He left Camp Custer Feb. 27, 1918 for Camp Green North Carolina, and was there transferred to the 39th Inf. machine gun Co. He went with his company to Camp Mills, L. I., April 26, 1918.

May 7, 1918-sailed overseas. The 5th day of August he was with 4 comrades operating a machine gun at St. Thibait on the Vesle River, during the Marne Champagne. The four threw themselves face down on the ground waiting for further orders, when a shell burst that injured three of them. Don, being the most severely wounded, and though he received immediate surgical attention, he died in a hospital two days later on Aug. 7, 1918. A letter was received by his parents from a comrade stating his death.

No official notice was received until in Dec. 1918, his parents tried through the Red Cross and other ways, but all in vain until in Dec. 1918.

He was buried at Bayoches Ainse, France. Don was a graduate from Williamston, Mich. High school.

Mark S. McKie, Serial No. 1581229,

was single, color white. He was born in Locke Township, Nov. 9, 1895, his parents being James and Helen McKie. He was a graduate of Williamston high school. He had two brothers, Don, who died in service in France during the Marne Champagne and Ferris at home. He entered his first camp at Fort Thomas Oct. 24, 1917; he was assigned to 1st class private, Ambulance Co. 38 division; Nov. 28, 1917 Camp Shelby, Miss; Oct. 1, 1918 Camp Mills; Oct. 6, 1918 sailed overseas; Oct. 30, 1918 transferred to Ambulance Co. 102, 26 division.

Received his discharge at Camp Taylor, Ky. May 15, 1919.

Roy McKie,

was single, color white. He was born April 12, 1891 Webberville, Mich. But later moved to Locke with his parents Alexander and Anna McKie. He entered his first Camp Nov. 21, 1917 at Camp Custer; he was assigned to Battery F, 328 T.A.

He has one sister and one brother; namely, Mrs. Gerthie _____ (last name omitted) and Howard McKie. He was discharged from Camp Custer, Feb. 19, 1918; reason insanity, dementia praxia hebephrenia tupeper 4th endorsement SCDHJ 85 division.

ROBERT H. HALSTEAD FIRST MASON BOY

To Lose Life In Service Of His Country

Is One of Ten Lost On Westover, Submarine Victim--Was Assistant Paymaster

Robert Herbert **Halstead**, of Lansing, former Mason boy and well known here, is the first one our boys to pay the supreme sacrifice. Last Thursday night the Navy Department announced the torpedoing of the American supply vessel, Westover, in the war zone on July 11. Robert, who was Assistant Paymaster, was one of the ten officers and members of the crew reported missing.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. H. O. **Halstead** and the grandson of Mrs. Elizabeth **Halstead**, of Lansing. The family received the message from the Bureau of Navigation late last Thursday evening announcing merely that Ensign **Halstead** was missing. News of their son's death came after three nights of worry. Before sailing he had written that if he landed safely she would hear from him by Saturday or Sunday July 13 or 14. When no word was received Monday, they became alarmed. According to a neighbor, three nights passed, during which time the anxious mother had no sleep, before the message came.

Robert was twenty-three years of age. He was born in Mason, where his early youth was spent until the family moved to Lansing eight years ago. He attended the Mason High school and after moving to Lansing completed his course at the Lansing high school in June 1913.

He was a student at the University of Michigan three years and at the University of California one year.

June 3rd, the Westover, on which Ensign **Halstead** lost his life, narrowly escaped being sunk by the German submarine, which operated off the eastern coast of the United States, sinking a dozen ships. Robert joined the boat at Norfolk as paymaster and she was on her way to New York for cargo when she ran into the operating zone of the German submarine and put out boats to rescue the crew of one of the schooners attacked. Given the signal to get away, the Westover got off on a zig-zag course and escaped the submarine in a fog which arose.

While the Westover was loading in New York for its maiden trip, Robert was given leave which allowed him one day at home with his parents. He enlisted in the navy last August and was made a chief petty officer and on competitive examination was commissioned ensign. He then took a course in the paymaster's training school in Washington and was assigned to the Westover.

His many Mason friends are greatly grieved by his death and sympathize with his parents and grandmother. (The Ingham County News, Mason, Michigan, Thursday, July 25, 1918, page 1, column 3 —There was a picture of Robert in the Ingham County News, but it would not copy well.)
